

A personal view

THERE'S a shy little bird, creeping among the vegetation under my hedge, and hopping on the edge of the lawn. It's a dunnock – but it surprises me how often a mention of its name draws a quizzical response, as these little brown and grey birds are very common in our gardens and parks.

Perhaps many assume all small brown birds the size of a robin but without a red breast must be sparrows, by which they mean the house sparrow – the bird most often spotted in the RSPB's Big Garden Birdwatch, conducted in January each year. Yet we've seen many more dunnocks than house sparrows in our garden during the eleven years we've lived here in Goldsworth Park.

Dunnocks are cautious birds, about the size of a robin, which live close to the ground and tend to hide in the undergrowth. They eat insects, spiders, worms and seeds. Dunnocks were once informally called hedge sparrows, but they're not a member of the sparrow family, but of a family of birds called accentors. The name "dunnock" comes from the English dun (dingy brown, dark-coloured) and the diminutive ock. "Accentor" derives from Latin and means a person who sings with another.

Telling a dunnock apart from a house sparrow is easy – just look at the beak: a dunnock's beak is slender (thin and pointy), whereas a sparrow has a thick beak. Dunnocks have grey underparts and streaky brown backs. At first glance the head may appear grey, but on closer inspection you'll see it's dark on the top and there is a distinctive darker area around the eyes, extending towards the back of the head. A juvenile dunnock is much more heavily streaked than an adult and appears browner. Dunnocks face many threats, so have an average lifespan of just two years. Sparrowhawks and domestic cats are common predators.

As they are ground-feeding birds, don't expect them to join other birds at a hanging feeder \neg although I've seen them do so occasionally. You're more likely to see them underneath the feeder, taking seeds other birds have knocked to the ground. They primarily eat insects and spiders, so you'll often spot them hopping along the ground in search of ants, beetles and other insects. During winter there are fewer insects around, so they rely more on seeds to survive.



Our lawn has a mesh ground feeding cage, which we stock with sunflower seeds and mealworms. It attracts many small groundfeeding birds, especially dunnocks and robins, whilst keeping out the woodpigeons which would otherwise scoff the lot in no time at all! Dunnocks nest in hedges, shrubs and bushes. They usually lay four or five eggs and may have up to three broods a year. As they are abundant in our garden and we see youngsters, we've concluded they nest somewhere deep in our hedge.

Sometimes in summer I've enjoyed seeing an adult taking food from the cage to pass to a juvenile dunnock lurking shyly beneath the hedge. Gradually, youngsters grow in confidence until they can feed themselves, taking insects from the lawn margins, eventually entering our feeder cage. I've been treated to the sight of two juveniles visiting the feeder behind an adult, which was probably leading them on!

Dunnocks tend to show caution at the beginning of the season, hopping out from beneath the hedge to the feeding cage and rarely staying there long before hopping back to safety. But they grow in confidence, spending more time in the open. While sitting on my lawn, one dunnock was spending several minutes at a time in the open, gorging on ants, and came right up to me.

If you've never seen a dunnock, look beneath hedgerows and within the undergrowth for this little grey/brown bird, hopping around and pecking at insects. And look carefully at any "sparrows" you see: if it has a thin, pointy beak instead of a thick one, it's more likely a dunnock!

News from St Andrew's by Revd Scott Smith

Greetings Goldsworth Park!

I hope you're all well, and especially now that sun has just (finally) begun to shine on us once again.

In the last edition, regular columnist, Royer Slater invited us, (challenged us?) to consider how we might make someone's day by greeting them with a smile or even with a friendly 'Hello'.

And then last month I was in a meeting where the idea of community came up. With Goldsworth Park being a newer development, it was suggested that it perhaps didn't have a great sense of community.

But I have to say, that hasn't been my experience in the (approaching) two-years that I have lived here. I've found people have smiled, have greeted me with a 'Hello' or a 'Good Morning' as I've been out-and-about.

Community is defined, in the dictionary at least, as, 'a group of people living in the same place or having a particular characteristic in common.' It's also defined as, 'the condition of sharing or having certain attitudes and interests in common.'

All of us living in Goldsworth Park may have different reasons for being here, but each of us knows it as home. All of us have that in common.

More recently I've been reading about the effects of loneliness and social isolation. One article I read said that, 'Social isolation is associated with a higher risk of death in older people regardless of whether they consider themselves lonely'. It's true too that loneliness increases the risk of premature death by nearly 30%, with one report revealing that those with poor social relationships also had a greater risk of stroke and heart disease. Isolation, it says, also elevates a person's likelihood for experiencing depression, anxiety and dementia. Which makes for a fairly depressing read, doesn't it.

Football Club get behind Litter Pick

THE most recent litter pick took place on the 11th May on a sunny afternoon and it was great to have several of you, of all ages join us on the day – a big thank you to all involved.

This time we were also very grateful to receive the support of our local children's football club, Goldsworth Park Rangers, who advertised the event through their club and several of them helped out on the day.

The GPCA would very much welcome support from other organisations or businesses for future litter picks too – this could be a nice team building/social responsibility event for your organisation! Please contact **social@ourgoldsworthpark.org.uk** to discuss.

Each of the sections are running great, full and fun packed meetings as well as taking part in District and County activities.

The Cub Pack has taken part in Back to Basics Camp, Group Camp, Pod's Sleepover, District Sports evening, District Science day and Remembrance Parade.

The Scout Troop has taken part in Volunteering with Surrey Wildlife Trust, IG Radio Camp, JOTA, Group camp, Remembrance Parade, County Scoutabout along with International Camps in Kanderstag Switzerland & Ypres Last Post in Belgium.

The Leadership team we have running our meetings all work together to help each other, which in turn helps when the young person moves between sections.

Beavers may be the youngest of the Group but are in no way afraid to get stuck in. They have recently taken part in 'Reach for the stars' which is a camp done from home thanks to the objectives being set online and they achieved their space badges among many others. Science day was a hit with many experiments to take part in and natural wonders to view, talk about and even handle. We are looking forward to the warmer weather so we can enjoy the Great outdoors.

Our Cubs section is always thriving with many Cubs earning the badge requirements over about two and half years, which build up

to being awarded the Chief Scout Silver Award. To gain this they learn traditional Scouting & life skills which help set them up for going on to be more independent in the Troop. Over the past two terms we have had visits from Ashleigh (a guide dog pup) and her foster family, helping the Cubs learn how important a guide dog can be



to someone with impaired vision. To show our thanks the Cubs put on 'every cuppa counts' evening for their parents & family members where in half an hour they raised an impressive £138 in aid of Guide Dogs UK.

Scouts: Through the colder months the Scout Troop have learned Emergency aid skills, looked at international issues and managed to put on a small show all in aid of building skills, some have gone so far as earn radio licenses or volunteered to help conserve the local commons. As the evenings grow lighter and warmer, expect to see us out and about in our wooded areas and open spaces as our young people learn traditional scouting skills. None of this is possible of course without our adult volunteers such as Craig Braisby who has played a vital role in Goldsworth Park Scouts but now has answered the call for need at a local Woking Explorer unit to help other people as Scouters do. He will be missed and we would like to thank Craig for all his efforts and wish him all the best in new ventures.


