### **Natural Goldsworth Park Update**



OUR efforts to establish wildflowers on the meadow began in 2019 with the planting of trial plots that were stripped of turf. Since then GPCA volunteers have planted seeds over a couple of years but results have been disappointing due to the fertile soil and predominance of rye grasses.

However, we haven't given up hope of adding some colour to the meadow with trustees Tina and Celia attending a wildflower planting course organised by the Surrey Wildlife Trust in the hope of finding a solution to the difficulties we face. The cost of the course is being met with funds from the donation to Natural Goldsworth Park (NGP) made by the John Lewis Partnership (JLP) as part of their Give a Little Love scheme. If, after the course it is considered viable to attempt a seeding programme, the costs will be met from the JLP donation.

NGP volunteers took part in cherry laurel clearance last year around the woodland walk. We are planning to do the same later this year in conjunction with land owners Thames Water. Please keep an eye on the NGP Facebook group page for a date.

We are still looking for someone to take on the role of NGP project manager to lead the efforts to conserve and manage the meadow and woodland as unspoilt open space. If you are interested or would like more information please contact **chair@ourgoldsworthpark.org.uk**

### **Brockhill closes its doors**

BROCKHILL, Woking Borough Council's extra-care sheltered accommodation in Clifton Way, is closing its doors for good on September 30th 2024.

The building, which opened in 1990, will then be demolished to avoid any vandalism or squatter problems that could arise from leaving a large building empty.

Most residents from the 48 units have now been found alternative accommodation, but a few may need to stay in interim accommodation until suitable long-term homes are found.

Following consultation with residents, Woking Council approved the closure of Brockhill in February. If the building remained open the council would need to undertake significant fire safety remedial work and replace the heating system. The estimated spend over the next 10 years for maintenance and other upgrades would be close to £6million.That level of investment is considered unviable for a building of its age and size

Action has been taken to manage the fire safety risks, including the introduction of a team of evacuation officers at a cost to the council's housing revenue account of around £24,000 a week.

The council will put the site up for sale on the open market where it expects there to be strong interest and says the income from any sale will be spent only on council homes. The site is expected to remain designated for specialist residential use, such as sheltered accommodation or retirement homes, with any future development being sympathetic to the character of the area.

Woking Council's Strategic Director for Communities, Louise Strongitharm said: "The ongoing costs and capital expenditure required to keep the building safe and compliant with regulatory standards is simply

unviable given the small number of remaining residents, size and age of the housing scheme.

We have successfully supported many Brockhill residents to move to suitable alternative accommodation locally, based on their needs and preferences, since the decision to close the extra care scheme in February."

Woking expects to recoup the cost of demolition from the site purchasers.

## A personal view

#### **Royer Slater**

WHERE good looks are concerned in the insect world, butterflies tend to win the honours. Now a new kid on the block is winning respect – and it's a moth.

Often confused for a butterfly because of its striking colours and patterns, the Jersey Tiger moth is being spotted in increasing numbers in our area.

I was alerted to its presence here when Steve Davies shared with me his photo of a Jersey Tiger in his Goldsworth Park garden. After publishing it last year in my weekly Out and About feature in the Woking News & Mail, readers from all around responded with sightings and photos. The reports continued this summer.



Gerry Smeethers has posted several photos of Jersey Tigers on the Natural Goldsworth Park Facebook group. They include caterpillars as evidence they are breeding here.



The moth used to be confined to the Channel Islands and pockets of the south coast of England, especially Devon. In 2019 an unusually large influx of migrants was recorded in the southern half of the UK. Caterpillars from eggs laid by these migrants boosted the numbers of moths flying in 2020. Since then they have spread northwards through England.


It is named for the distinctive markings on its forewings, which resemble a tiger's stripes. These are closed in Steve's photo, so they hide the moth's bright red hindwings, which have large black spots, shown in the photo below from the Butterfly Conservation charity.



The Jersey Tiger is most often seen flying on warm days, but also at night. It can be found anywhere, in gardens, parks and hedgerows. Its caterpillars feed on a wide variety of plants, such as dandelions, nettles, white dead nettle, plantains, borage, ground-ivy and bramble.

## Moths – the invisible pollinators

Unlike the Jersey Tiger, most moths fly only at night. Yet they play a vital unseen role in our lives. While we can't deny the importance of bees as pollinators, new findings suggest moths are better and more important.



Moths pollinate at a faster rate than day-flying insects, they pollinate over much larger distances and they pollinate plants rarely visited by other insects. The research gives moths the credit they deserve in seed production, a significant process that benefits wild plants and creatures as well as the production of human food crops.

Just as we learned of moths' importance, there is news that many moth species are in serious decline across Britain, especially the south. This has a knock-on effect not only on the pollination we need for food and plants, but for their part in the food chain for bats, birds and other creatures. If moths continue to decline, many other species and the wider ecosystem will be put at further risk.

Many factors are causing a decline in the populations of moths and other insect, including climate change and intensive agriculture. Light pollution – especially street lights – is another. They are naturally drawn to light, and may spend a lot of time and effort travelling to artificial lights, and often circling them, leaving them too exhausted to find food or breed. They are also more likely to be gobbled up by predators.

We can help moths by turning off night lights, by planting white flowers (as some moths are attracted to them) and by growing patches of scrub and rough grass. You might even create a pesticide-free wild space in your garden or patio, where butterflies and moths can complete their life cycle: there's lots of advice online at butterfly-conservation.org/wild-spaces.

We need moths, so let's love and look after them!

IT seems a long time since the Goldsworth Park Summer Fair: thanks to all of you who came and supported a lovely day of community. It was great to chat with many of you, in between 'Splatting some Rats'!

As September rolls around, I wonder how we approach the impending arrival of autumn as well as a new school year? Perhaps it's been a mad rush to ensure you have the right school uniform or the right number of pencils or glue-sticks.

Perhaps you're looking forward to getting away on holiday now that prices have dropped with children heading back to school. Perhaps the mere thought of autumn brings you to lament the ending of summer and the inevitable progress towards winter.

## From the Lakeside

■ Roger Westcott is Goldsworth Park Angling Club secretary and fishing bailiff working in partnership with Woking Borough Council to oversee fishing, monitor fish stocks and other wildlife, and keep the area clean and tidy.



I'm sure most of you will have noted by now our pair of swans have been very busy over the last few months caring for their five offspring who by now are almost as big as themselves and already showing their individual characteristics. You can easily see who's the braver and who's a little more reserved – no pun intended but, "the pecking order as they say". The cob and his Mrs have been doing a great job keeping them safe by letting us know quite clearly with puffed necks and a hiss or two dare we get to close, albeit we may only want to offer a treat and admire.



When it comes to those treats, whether for the swans or any other wildfowl round the lake, please discourage from feeding too much bread, it's not good for them and never feed them on land, only on the water. Dry food is not good for them, they need to take in water with their food to help digestion, plus any uneaten foods on the ground just encourages rats and believe me, this year in particular we have more than our fair share of them on site. We don't wish to discourage anyone from feeding the birds however do think about the welfare of them. Consider rather than just bread try purpose made wild fowl pellets easily obtained from pet shops, garden centres and even from Quackers cafe by the side of the lake – it's as cheap as chips, full of nutrition and the birds love them. Just think if one hundred people each came down with 2 slices of bread that's a lot of loaves and when I say one hundred people that is not by any means an exaggeration

particularly at weekends where you could easily double that number. We have a great little cafe but we don't need a bakery.

Having said that, the amount of bird life and other wildlife this year is truly amazing. Everywhere you look it's either a flock of geese or coot or jackdaw or long-tailed tit, damsel or dragonflies around every reed bed. Swifts and martins skimming the water for insects, frogs and toads in the water margins, even the odd grass snake going for an early morning swim – the list goes on and on. Then there are the fish hidden beneath the surface, anything from a tiddler to a monster carp or a metre long pike all making the park and lake their home. However all this needs a little helping hand here and there, and that's where we come in, us humans, whether it's picking up a bit of litter or trimming overgrown foliage or just being mindful on how we use our open spaces, so it remains for us to enjoy it's wonders and for future generations.

The Angling Club is now in its tenth year on the lake and in that time, we have been investing both time and money looking after the lake and our ponds in Brookwood by running work parties, holding fishing events and even running charity events. As an example on the 10th August, we held a fishing competition and raffle to raise money for our local Multiple Sclerosis Society.



Despite the fact fishing proved hard going on the day, but ha that's why we call it fishing and not catching. The lads had a great time and managed to raise over £400.00 on the day and with still more donations coming in the MS piggy bank is getting fatter. Which leaves me to say well done everyone who took part whether by fishing or donating or buying raffle tickets. "Thank You" so much.


