## GPCA AGM 2024



The AGM of the GPCA was held on 23 October 2024 and included a wide range of subjects. After the GPCA Chair, George Binyon, had welcomed everyone, there was an energy saving talk by a volunteer from Zero Carbon Guildford's Home Energy Advice Taskforce which provides a free no obligation, impartial energy efficiency advice service. Residents can request a free thermal home survey: www.zerocarbonguildford.org/energy-surveys.

George gave an overview of the GPCA activities over the year, which included:

- · Laying a wreath at the Remembrance Day service
- Supplying, erecting and decorating the Christmas tree in the shopping centre, with St Andrew's Church and Goldsworth Park Angling Club
- Meeting throughout the year with various members of Woking Borough Council and Surrey County Council
- Two GPCA Trustees attended a Surrey Wildlife Trust wildflower course, after which Yellow Rattle seed was planted: see the Natural Goldsworth Park article on this page for details.
- Running various working parties including litter picks and cherry laurel clearance
- Running the refreshment stall for the Woking and Sam Beare Hospice Dragon Boat race day
- Sponsoring the children's rides at the Summer Fair organised by the Guides and St Andrew's Church
- Supporting the Lakeview Community Fun Day; and
- Running a tea and cake afternoon for local residents.

The Treasurer's Report showed that the GPCA incurred a loss of £1,421 for the year ending 30th June 2024. The loss is down to the GPCA funding the fairground rides for the summer fair, donations to the Lakeview Community Fun Day, the wildflower course and insurance plus a shortfall between the cost of the Christmas tree and donations received. The sole source of GPCA income is from advertising in Goldsworth News but the aim is for advertising to cover magazine

costs rather than be an income source: this was achieved during the reporting period.


The Chair informed the meeting that the GPCA Facebook Group now has more than 1700 members, and thanked all the Councillors for responding to the various items raised via the Group.

Roger Westcott (Goldsworth Park Angling Club) spoke about activities supported by the club and about wildlife on Goldsworth Park Lake. The club has been operating for 10 years and has grown in strength with matches against other clubs, some of which raise money for charities. The Club continues to be involved in or to lead the planting and maintenance of the lake and lakeside and is always willing to assist and work with the GPCA.

He said that a wide variety of birds has been seen using the lake or lakeside throughout the year. Five cygnets are progressing well and starting to fly, so will at some point leave for pastures new. An item of concern is that people are feeding the wildlife. Roger pointed out that food left on the bank encourages rats so visitors should stop doing this so the rat population will decline. Visitors should not feed bread to the birds. Pellets are available and food must be thrown only on the water, NOT on the bank, which feeds rats. People should keep a distance from all wildlife so they do not become associated with humans and reliant on us. Roger and the Club were thanked for their ongoing support.

Under the election of Trustees, Bob Cowell and Hilary Addison were re-elected following the completion of their periods, while Celia Young, Dueyna Chinere and Tina Hartley had expressed their wish to continue as Trustees and did not require re-election. George Binyon announced that he is retiring as a Trustee and also as GPCA Chair. He was thanked for all his hard work over the years and presented with a gift from the Trustees.

The meeting closed after Saj Hussain (Surrey CC Councillor) had thanked the Trustees and volunteers for their support.



## Natural Goldsworth Park Update

Since the last magazine two GPCA Trustees attended a wildflower course run by the Surrey Wildlife Trust. The course was most informative and recommended the sowing of Yellow Rattle seeds on the meadow. Yellow Rattle acts as a partial parasite, locking into the grasses and feeding off them so making them weaker. This should then allow other wildflowers the chance to grow.

Seeding has taken place in over 100 2mx2m plots scattered around the meadow. The hope is that this approach will enable self-seeding to occur so that Yellow Rattle will spread naturally across the meadow. If successful other wildflowers can be sown in future years.

Further clearance of cherry laurel around the woodland walk is planned with the land owners, Thames Water. Please keep an eye on the NGP Facebook group page for a date.

The GPCA is still looking for someone to take on the role of NGP project manager to lead the efforts to conserve and manage the meadow and woodland as unspoilt open space. If you are interested or would like more information please contact editor@ourgoldsworthpark.org.uk

## A personal view

## **Royer Slater**

"Goldsworth Park's church was built upside down!" remarked a visitor to our parish church, St Andrew's. It's a fair comment because few churches have their main worship area upstairs.

Visitors at weekday events in Andy's community café may not even be aware there's a huge upstairs space used for Sunday worship and special services such as weddings, baptisms (or "Christenings") and funerals.

The church was designed to satisfy the wishes of early church members for a church building that would be used seven days a week and by the wider community of Goldsworth Park.

Let's step inside. The beautiful upstairs space is reached by stairs at each side, or by a lift at the car park end. The seating is usually arranged for services in a semicircle, rising in tiers towards the back. Unlike traditional aisled churches, no one is seated far from the front and everyone can see and hear what's happening. The intimacy and informality of this arrangement has been acclaimed by visitors to such events such as weddings and baptisms. (By contrast I've sat on uncomfortable pews in traditional churches, where pillars blocked my view of the wedding or baptism I had come to see!)


The congregation area at St Andrew's is fully carpeted, the seats are comfortably upholstered and there's a super-duper sound system with a deaf aid loop, as well as a pair of overhead projectors that display words and pictures during services.

The semi-circular seating reflects the intimacy early worshippers had enjoyed on Sundays in the school hall at Beaufort School, where members of the new parish of St Andrew's Goldworth Park would meet on Sundays until the church building opened in 1988 at Goldsworth Park Centre.

There are other interesting aspects of the building's design, which was by the renowned church architect Robert Potter – St Andrew's Goldsworth Park is cited on his

Wikipedia page! The sloping roof sections above reflect the tents used by worshippers in biblical times and also that the apostle Paul supported himself by making tents while preaching Jesus's Gospel.





The church is dedicated to the first disciple to be called by Jesus, St Andrew, who was a fisherman so the dais is pointed like the prow of a ship.

The design also fosters a sense of intimacy even when the church is full. During Sunday services it reinforces the sense that membership of St Andrew's is to be one of a church family, where people know, love and support each other.

Down at ground level, the building was designed for the wider community: welcoming newcomers and visitors and supporting those in need have always been key parts of the St Andrew's philosophy during the week as well as Sundays. The largest area on the ground floor is Andy's Community Café, which is where many community events are held on weekdays. The St Andrew's Chapel, used for church meetings of up to 30 people, occupies one corner at the south side of the building. The church office is nearby, as well as a smaller office used by the Christian charity, Engage Woking Schools.

At the other end of the building are the east-facing main entrance (with sensor-operated doors for easy disabled access), toilets, utility rooms, storerooms and access to the A2 Youth & Community Hall.

The design on two levels makes optimum use of land donated for the church by Goldsworth Park's developers, Ideal Homes. The location benefits from being at the heart of the Goldsworth Park community, between the shops and Health Centre. However, the site was too narrow to accommodate everything on one level, so the architect's design places those areas where visitors are welcomed during the week on the ground floor, and makes the whole upstairs area available for the main "worship area".

If you've never seen inside St Andrew's Church, someone will be pleased to show you around: contact the church office Monday to Thursdays, 9.30am to 4pm on 01483 723879.

The St Andrew's church web site (standrewgwp.org) includes lots of information on the church and its building, and even reassuring advice if you're going to church for the first time.

## Lakeside lights

Work has now been done to remove foliage around lights 4, 5, 12 to 15 and 17.

with residents in the coming weeks.

## Play equipment at Goldsworth Centre

Cllr Barker has asked the managing agents to add a notice near the playground advising who to contact if there are issues with playground equipment.

## Fly tipping

Fly tipping continues to be an issue in a number of areas of Goldsworth Park. Cllr Oades has reported multiple incidents in Lakeview.

## **Lakeview Community Centre**

In this edition's update from Lakeview, I would like to introduce our longest running activity at the Lakeview Community Centre: "Lift Up Together" which meets on Thursday afternoons at the Centre, 12 to 3.30pm. I will let them tell their story in their own words:

"I am Karen and our wonderful group of people is called Lift Up **Together** – and that is what we do: we lift each other up emotionally and with no judgement. Mainly for those suffering with mental health issues (diagnosed or not), we also cater for those at risk of developing mental health issues i.e. the lonely and isolated, such as new mums, those new to the area, the recently divorced or separated and also those in care homes. We also welcome family and unpaid carers, or friends of the people who are affected. We have a membership of about 45 people at present but it fluctuates through the year.

"At each session we provide a hot lunch in the colder months and sandwiches, wraps and similar during the warmer months plus hot and cold drinks year round. To avoid temptation and risky behaviour, alcohol and drug use as well as bullying are not tolerated.

"We also run activities such as bingo with treats at prizes such as cakes and chocolate, and a quiz which each table enters as a team and small sweets are given to all who participate on the wining table. Mums who come to our group are grateful to be able to bring their preschool children during term time and all children during the school holidays during the weeks we are open.



"As well as weekly sessions throughout the year, we usually have a summer outing and a party in the run-up to Christmas. We celebrated our 20 year anniversary recently with a party, which was enjoyed as much by the volunteer staff as by the members.

"This warm and welcoming group is completely free to all. We are actively looking for funding to keep this group open for another 20 years at least! If you'd like more information please contact me, Karen Smith, on 07914639956."

In other news, in October I was pleased to join Woking's ROC (Reclaim Our Communities) Conversation. It was a great opportunity to meet up with a wide variety of different community groups from across Woking and see how we can work together. For Lakeview specifically, I highlighted the need for more volunteers to help restart our children's group "Little Minions" targeted at the primary school age group.

We are already thinking about how we can run more activities at the Lakeview Centre next year and hope to hold another Fun Day in the summer. The next Lakeview Community Action Group meeting is on the 7th January 2025 at 7.30pm at the Lakeview Community Centre.

## **Power Chair or Scooter?**

Many of our members use our hire service because they have temporary or permanent mobility issues. There is often a strong preference for either powerchairs or larger mobility scooters. However, there is a distinct difference however between the different types of equipment we have for hire and how they can help you while you are in Woking Town Centre or for home and holiday hire.

Recently a client booked a power wheelchair to have ear wax removed at Specsavers. They told us afterwards that the staff found it a lot easier to accommodate the power chair in the treatment room, than a mobility scooter which is much longer and not so easy to turn, so the door has to stay open during the procedure, reducing privacy.

Therefore for visiting Specsavers (where shopMobility members get 25% off glasses) a power chair would be a better option than a scooter. Power chairs can also be easier to get in and out of lifts, as you can turn the chair without having to reverse to exit. They are also easier to manoeuvre in shops where access is limited.

We offer advice and help for all our equipment so if you have not used a power chair before our team can help. Just let us know in advance and we will give you a complete guide to how to use a chair and let you practice before you go out into the shopping centre. Whether you are using a powered wheelchair or mobility scooter remember these are powerful machines and must be driven in public spaces with respect. It is essential to maintain low speeds at all times and to watch what is happening around for everyone's safety.
